Water Conservation & Restrictions

Sandia Heights Services

Bernalillo County Water Restrictions

- From April 1 until October 31, no spray or sprinkler irrigation is allowed between 11:00 AM and 7:00 PM.
- Landscape irrigation should not be applied or sprayed in such a manner and/or quantity that it causes runoff onto adjacent properties or public rights-of-way.
- Contact the Bernalillo County Water Waste Hotline at 505-224-2100 to report time-of-day and water-waste violations.

Bathroom Water Conservation

- Don't leave water running while brushing your teeth or shaving.
- Take short showers instead of tub baths; showers use less water.
- If taking a bath, plug the drain right away and adjust the temperature as it fills.
- When washing your hands, turn off the water while you lather.

Kitchen Water Conservation

- Don't use water to defrost frozen foods; thaw foods in the refrigerator overnight.
- Scrape dishes rather than rinsing them before loading them into the dishwasher.
- Compost food waste instead of using the garbage disposal or throwing it in the trash. This is an especially good tip for those on a septic system, as ground garbage fills up the holding tank quickly.
- Keep a container of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool.

Outdoors Water Conservation

- Purchase an inexpensive hose timer to avoid over-watering.
- Collect rainwater to use on your landscape.
- Use a broom or electric blower to clean driveways and sidewalks rather than hosing them off.
- When washing your car, use an adjustable nozzle or sprayer and turn off the water stream while soaping your vehicle.



Special Election for Congress on Tuesday, June 1

When Deb Haaland, our elected representative to Congress, resigned to become Secretary of the Department of the Interior, her seat became vacant and so there will be special election on Tuesday, June 1.

I urge all registered voters to learn about the six candidates, including two write-in candidates, and vote, either in person—on election day, or during the early-voting session the two weeks before the election—or via mail, aka absentee.

Here is a timeline from the Office of the NM Secretary of State:

May 4, 2021—28 days before the election.

- Voter Registration (by mail or online) closes. However, qualified electors can use same-day registration (SDR) to submit a new voter registration form, or update their existing registration at select early voting and election day locations within their county of residence. For more information about the SDR locations and hours of operation, please contact the county clerk's office.
- County clerks can begin mailing ballots to voters who have requested an absentee ballot (in a timely fashion) and who are eligible to participate in the election (i.e., voter resides within the boundaries of CD1).
- Early in-person voting begins. Please note: The NM Election Code provides a directive to establish one early in-person polling location at the office of the county clerk. Additional Early Voting sites begin operating on the third Saturday before an election.

May 15, 2021: Additional early voting locations open. May 18, 2021: Last day to submit an absentee request for domestic mail ballots.

May 25, 2021: Last day that overseas Military voters can request an absentee ballot (for secure electronic transmission of the ballot; if the federal qualified elector is requesting that a ballot be sent by mail, the request must be made by the deadline of May 18).

May 29, 2021: Last day of early voting.

June 1, 2021: Election Day. Polling locations will be open from 7:00 AM until 7:00 PM. Voters may vote in-person at any of the locations within their registered county. Voters who have requested an absentee ballot may also return their sealed absentee ballot to a polling location within their registered county, no later than 7:00 PM on Election night.

Currently, there are six candidates running, one from each party, one independent, and two write-ins:

- Democratic, Melanie Stansbury, Representative NM Legislature
- Libertarian, Chris Manning
- Republican, Mark Moores, NM Senate
- No Party/Independent, Aubrey Dunn, former State Land Commissioner
- Write-in candidate, Laura Olivas
- Write-in candidate, Robert Ornelas

The League of Women Voters Central New Mexico, of which this writer is a member, will conduct interviews with the candidates and publish such material on their web site: LWVCNM.org, and probably the Albuquerque Journal will have information on the candidates. Further, all candidates will hold town hall meetings and will have information on their web sites.

Please call (505) 243-VOTE (8683) with any questions regarding absentee voting in Bernalillo County.

There will be 16 early voting centers, with details on the County Clerk web site. The closest one to us will be Caracol Plaza, 12500 Montgomery NE, Suite 101. Voting begins Saturday, May 15, 2021, and ends Saturday, May 29, 2021. Open times are Monday–Saturday 10 AM – 7 PM.

Bats in Your House

Why Bats Prefer to Roost in Attics and How to Keep Them Out By Alex Deckard of Critter Control, an SHHA Member Benefits Merchant

New Mexico is home to 29 species of bats. Depending on the species, bats will either migrate or hibernate during the winter. A few species of bats in New Mexico are solitary, but most bats roost in larger colonies.

Bats are very beneficial to the environment. They play a large role in pest control and pollination. Most species of bats in New Mexico are insectivores and, at night, a bat can eat more than half its weight in insects such as mosquitoes. Bats also pollinate trees, cacti, and agave.

Bats naturally roost in caves and hollow trees, but attics, voids in walls, and patios are also ideal locations for them. Though bats are great for the environment, they are not ideal visitors in your home.

The surest sign of a bat infestation is the accumulation of guano, or bat droppings. These are small, shiny black pellets. After time, bat guano and urine will create a strong odor like ammonia. A respiratory fungus (Histoplasma) can sometimes be present in guano. When breathed in, a deadly airborne disease, histoplasmosis, can develop. In addition, bats can transmit rabies; however, only a small percentage of bats are infected.

Protect Your Home from Bats

If you want to prevent bats from entering your home, preventative exclusion is the best precaution you can take. Because bats are not chewers like rodents, they only use existing entry points to make their way into your home. Smaller bats can crawl through a gap as small as 3/8 of an inch, so it is necessary to seal any gap that is a quarter of an inch or larger.

Another way to help prevent bats is to keep outside lights turned off at night. The lights attract insects, and insects are a huge food source for bats.

Additionally, bats drink a lot of water, so minimizing water sources around your property, if possible, is another way to help prevent bats and other wildlife from being a nuisance. However, with your home excluded, bats are great to have around your home.

If you want to keep your home free of bats but receive their benefits-free insect control and pollination—consider installing a bat house if your space and environment allow. A bat house provides a place other than your attic where bats can roost. Keep in mind, preventative exclusion is still recommended even with a bat house. (www.batcon.org/about-bats/bat-houses)

Bat Removal Process

Due to the dangers of exposure to guano and the ability for bats to squeeze through tiny spaces, consider hiring a professional to remove a colony of bats. If you are hiring a professional, check their reputation with reviews and testimonials and review their qualifications, such as membership with the The National Wildlife Control Operators Association.

A wildlife control inspector will perform a full interior and exterior inspection. Due to the dangers of exposure to guano, it is extremely important for a respirator to be worn when in an attic containing bats. After inspecting, he/she will construct a custom plan for your home to safely remove the bats and properly seal your home. Critter Control operators also provide warranty options as well as educate you on our recurring programs.

- If a bat(s) is in your living space at the time of the inspection, it will be the inspector's top priority to keep you as well as the bat(s) safe. Bats should never be handled with bare hands. Our wildlife specialist will use gloves specifically designed to handle animals and ensure the bat is safely released outdoors.
- The City of Albuquerque will pick up any bats suspected of being sick or injured.

The most effective and humane way to remove bats is by utilizing a bat valve in conjunction with a full home exclusion. A bat valve allows for bats to exit your home but not re-enter. Since each bat removal is unique, our specialist will use or create a bat valve(s) specifically for your home. Most removals only require one bat valve.

Once the wildlife specialist installs the bat valve, all other entry points are sealed, allowing for bats to exit through the valve. Bats typically exit the property within 3-7 days, depending on the colony size. After the waiting period, there needs to be another thorough inspection of the attic to ensure there are no bats present. Then the bat valve will be removed and the final entry point sealed.

Six species of bats are federally protected, and numerous states have specific laws and regulations regarding bat removal. To avoid breaking any laws or regulations, call a professional for help when dealing with a bat problem. Critter Control specializes in humane bat removal and prevention. 

Hi! We residents of Sandia Heights are noticing more piles of dog waste in peoples' yards; i.e., the roadside. The roadsides here ARE part of our yards and we like our yards clean. We would like to bring this to your attention so that if you notice dog walkers not cleaning up, or who don't seem to have bags, reminders are in order. Perhaps offer them a bag—any plastic bag will do. More of us are installing security cameras to reduce crime and, as a result we are also able to find out who needs reminders. If you have guests with dogs, please let them know what they need to do.

Here are a couple handy ways to carry doggie bags. **Photo** 1: tie a bag to your leash. **Photo** 2: get an inexpensive doggie pack that attaches to your leash—you can put a roll of clean bags in the pouch and fasten a used bag to the clip, as shown, until you get to a garbage can.

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
